

TYA Research across the network



Overview

Teenage and Young Adult (TYA) cancer research is essential for improving care and outcomes for young people. Research includes studies on quality of life, the impact of cancer treatment on fertility, and the ongoing support required during and after treatment, and social reintegration post cancer survivorship. We also facilitate TYA patients' involvement in biobanking, supporting future cancer research. By prioritising what is most important to young people, we aim to improve services and outcomes for those affected by cancer.



Research Highlight—Leeds Teaching Hospital

Reproductive function in TYA cancer survivors - PROTECT

PROTECT is a national study examining how cancer treatments impact reproductive function in TYA patients. The study aims to understand how cancer diagnosis, treatment, and age at treatment affect fertility markers and long-term reproductive health in survivors. The findings will help improve fertility preservation options and inform care strategies for TYA cancer patients in the future. The study is being delivered scientifically by the MRC group in Edinburgh, but has Leeds leadership in the design and implementation.





Research Highlight—Sheffield Teaching Hospital

Young Survivors of Cancer: Phase I study to determine the item sets for child, adolescent, and young adult cancer survivors

This study draws on the experience of health professionals and young survivors. Through semi structured interviews the study aims to find out what matters most to young people who have had cancer, providing professionals with recommendations about what should be monitored and managed following cancer treatment. The study follows from point of diagnosis, treatment and current life to identify these issues. This study is sponsored by Southampton University



Children's Research across the network



Overview

Research with children and young people with cancer has allowed 5-year survival rates to climb from 10% in the 1970s to 85% in the current decade. It has been an essential part of cancer care since the beginning, and Yorkshire and the Humber has been at the heart of hundreds of clinical studies over the years. The cancer clinical network is committed to continuing to make access to clinical studies as equitable, accessible, and comprehensive as possible



Research Highlight—Sheffield Children's Hospital

Respiratory virus point of care pilot


The team at Sheffield Children's have run a pilot project using a new respiratory virus point of care test machine which can test for 12 viruses and 4 bacteria in children with respiratory symptoms and give results in just 16 minutes. This allowed rapid decisions about the need for isolation, admission and antibiotics and the safety of proceeding with chemotherapy. The pilot study showed that the results influenced patient management in 43% of cases. This is the first use of this particular platform in children undergoing cancer therapy and we believe it may prove a very useful addition to haematology and oncology wards and day care units in the future.
